• Flagman: The head flagman is in charge of the corner marshals and is responsible for making flag signals to drivers under the direction of the Race Director. The head flagman and the race director shall conduct a pre-race

drivers meeting to brief competitors on the use of flags, special track conditions and other relevant information.

• Head Tech Inspector: He is in charge of pre and post race inspections for both general safety and compliance with technical specs.
